## Growing the College | Student Success

Central Carolina Technical College awarded more than 680 degrees, diplomas and certificates to 571 graduates from July 1, 2018 to June 30, 2019. At the commencement ceremony, the college's first mascot in 55 years was introduced, the Central Carolina Technical College Titan.

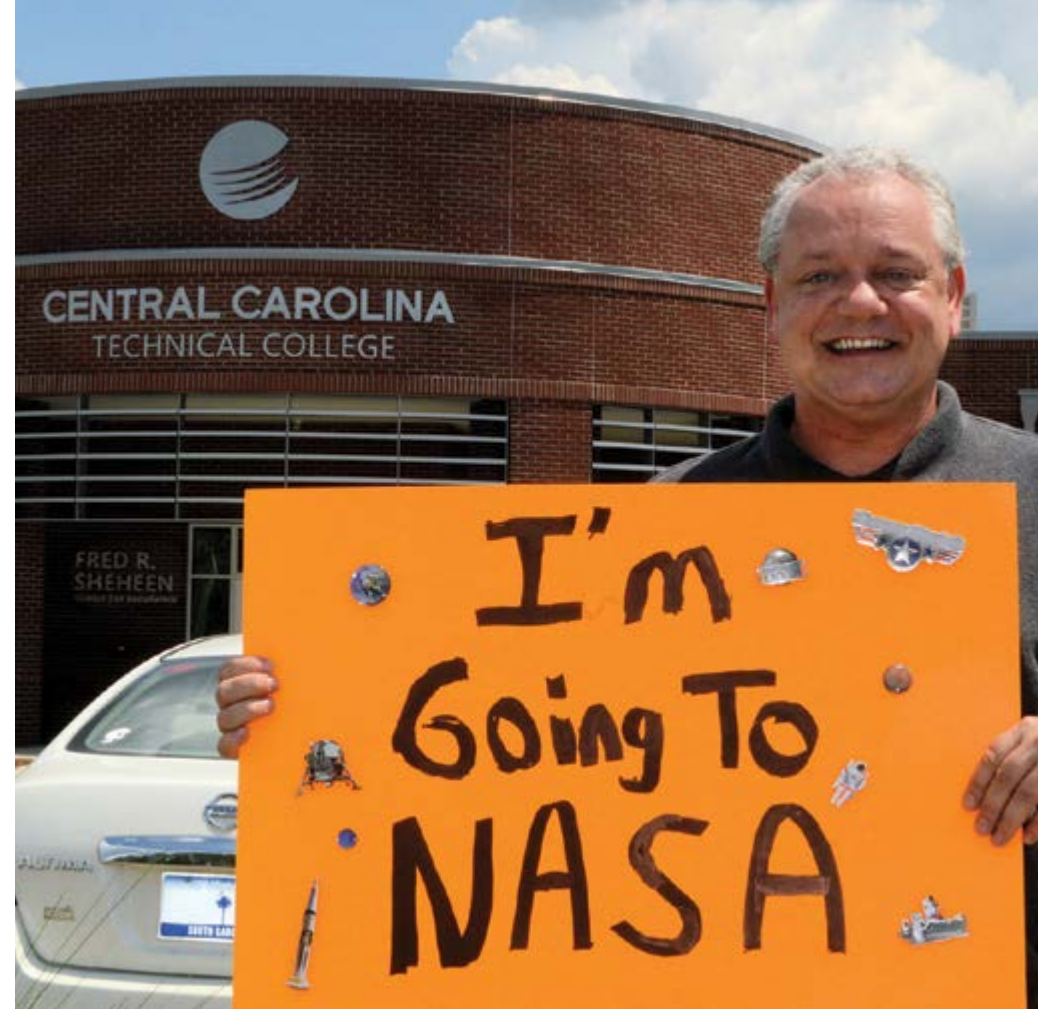
Representatives from local, county and state government helped cut the ribbon, officially opening the Fred R. Sheheen Center for Excellence at the college's Kershaw County Campus in Camden. The expansion of the Kershaw County Campus allowed the additional offering of two popular programs, Engineering Design Technology and Mechatronics, along with an on-site bookstore and library. The college is excited to grow our relationship with our neighbors: Kershaw Economic Development, Kershaw Chamber of Commerce and the Woolard Technology Center.

Developed four new programs of study: **Advanced Medical Coding Certificate, Logistics and Supply Chain Management Certificate, Marketing and Sales for Small Business Certificate and Office Management Certificate.** New programs of study are a prime example of the college's linkage between course offerings, instruction and workforce needs. New programs of study are vetted by advisory boards, executive leadership and finally the area commission.

## Improving Lives Through Education | Student Success

CCTC offered dual enrollment courses to over 700 qualifying high school students from a total of 22 area high schools, independent high schools and home-school associations. At commencement, 17 of these Early College students received a degree or certificate.

CCTC's Nursing Program was recognized as #6 in South Carolina by [www.RegisteredNurse.org](http://www.RegisteredNurse.org). The program moved up from its previous #7 ranking in 2017.

## Impacting our Communities | Student Success

The college partnered with Clarendon, Kershaw, Lee and Sumter Counties to offer an ongoing Central Carolina Scholars Program for qualifying high school seniors with full tuition assistance. The retention rate of a Scholars student is 28% higher than a traditional student.

### Participated in the Sumter Economic Development/the Link inaugural eSTEAM Festival in Downtown Sumter.

More than 3,000 people converged in downtown Sumter for the inaugural eSTEAM Festival. Local business and industry partnered with educators to help get kids excited about science, technology, engineering, art and math. These children are the future workforce for the surrounding area.

## Growing the College | Academic Excellence

The college formalized agreements with SC State University and Coastal Carolina University to streamline transfers between CCTC and both universities. Under the new partnership, CCTC students have an additional pathway to a bachelor's degree. Students who take classes at Central Carolina will be able to transfer to SC State to complete a bachelor's degree in 20 programs of study. CCTC students can transfer to Coastal Carolina as a true junior, start their respective majors, and aren't required to repeat courses for general education requirements.



Second-year welding student Sam DuBose placed first in the SkillsUSA Welding Competition in Pendleton, South Carolina. Mr. DuBose went on to place 14th in the nation at the Skills USA National Championship in Louisville, Kentucky.

CCTC hosted its third annual Academic Challenge. The Academic Challenge is a competition among high school teams in the college's four-county service area (Clarendon, Kershaw, Lee and Sumter). The Academic Challenge is structured in a Jeopardy/College Bowl format where teams compete against one another on topics that include: science, mathematics, health, history, business and industry, literature and popular culture. There are three areas of competition: general knowledge exam, team marketing competition and the academic challenge. This year's winning team was from Lugoff-Elgin High School.

## Impacting our Communities | Academic Excellence

**Behavioral Intervention Team (BIT) was established to increase student retention.** Support services are essential to the success of CCTC students. CCTC works to grow the whole student through friendships, experience and networking.

**VIQ TORY selected Central Carolina Technical College as a Military Friendly® School for the eighth consecutive year.** This designation means that the college dedicates itself to the military community and is "better for veterans." CCTC prides itself on offering higher education opportunities to active duty, dependents and veterans of Shaw Air Force Base.

**CCTC utilized Rural Utilities Services Distance and Learning Telemedicine Grant CONNECT classrooms to provide synchronous video and audio among Main Campus, Health Sciences Center, Lee County Site, Kershaw County Campus and F.E. DuBose Career Center.** This grant expanded the college's course offerings to better serve our rural population.

I accomplished half my entire associate degree before I even started college. Once I finished high school, I was then able to finish the rest of my associate degree at CCTC under the Central Carolina Scholars program. All of that was free! 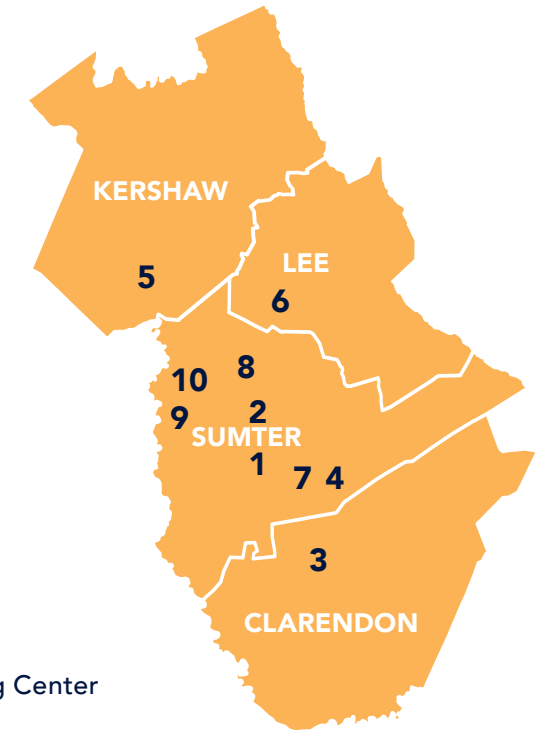
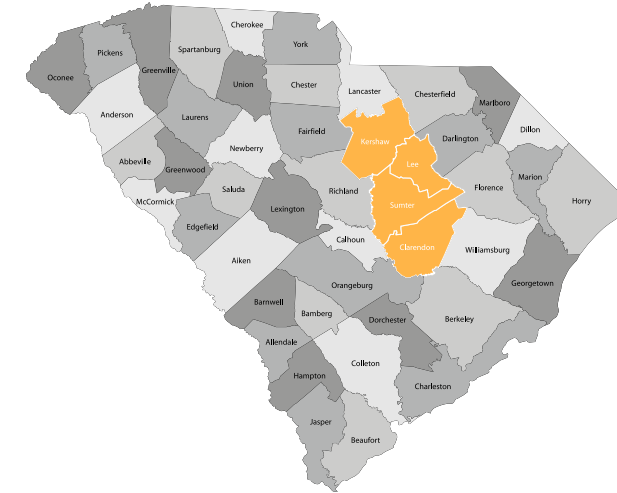

## Tee Off for Tuition | Golf Tournament

More than 130 golfers participated in the 9th annual Central Carolina Technical College Foundation Golf Tournament on Friday, October 4 at Beech Creek Golf Course. The generous support of 84 sponsors helped raise money for projects that support CCTC including, but not limited to: student scholarships, professional development for faculty and staff and funding for instructional equipment and facilities. Over the past nine years, the CCTC Foundation Golf Tournament has raised approximately \$307,000.

New to the 2019 tournament was honorary chairman J.R. Berry with WLTX, enhanced sponsorship levels, a change in venue and record high temperatures over 100 degrees.

The format for the tournament was a four person captain's choice with lunch provided at 11:30 a.m. and a 12:30 p.m. shotgun start. Awards included a Hole-In-One Grand Prize, Longest Drive Challenge and Closest to the Pin competition, in addition to cash prizes and trophies for the winning teams. The trophies were created by CCTC's Engineering Design Technology and Machine Tool Technology programs.

"It was a great day to be a Titan," says CCTC President Dr. Michael Mikota. "We were excited to host the 9th Annual Foundation Golf Tournament and connect our valued donors in a way that uniquely impacts the lives of our students."

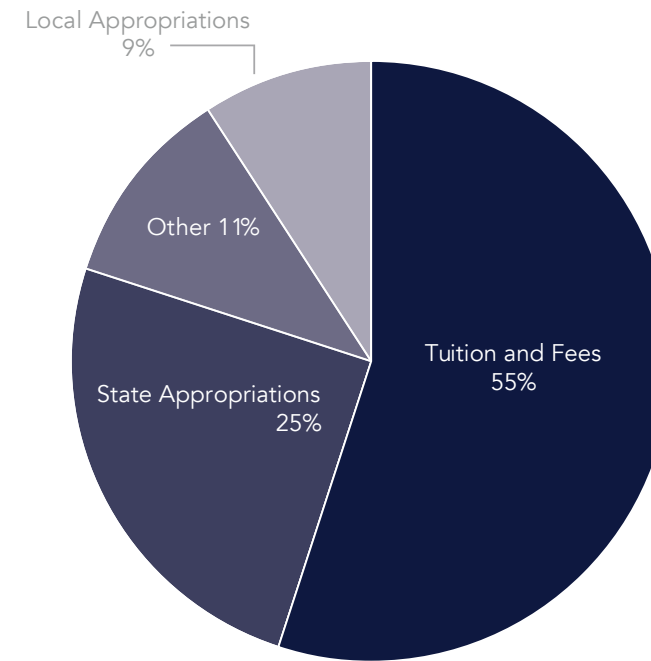

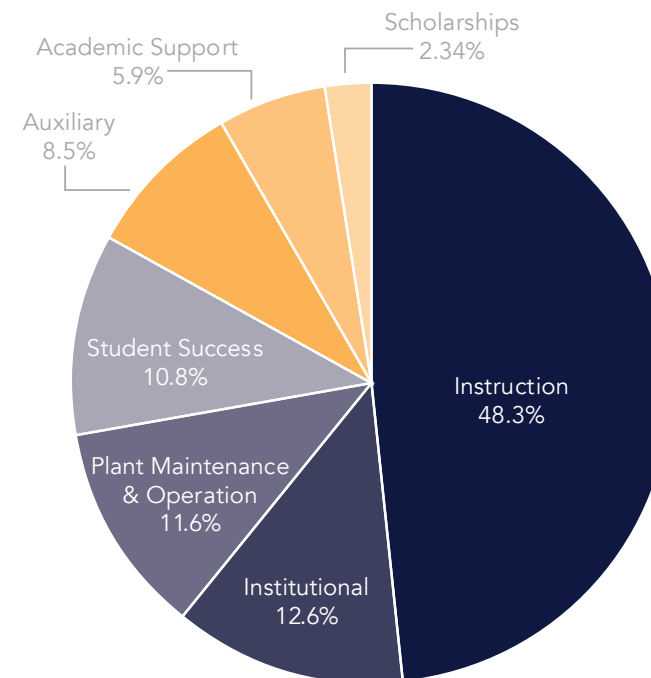
